

## Using unless

If and unless are conditional conjunctions.

### Look at the examples:

If you study, you will pass your exam.

You will pass your exam if you study.

Unless you study, you won't pass your exam.

You won't pass your exam unless you study.

Note: unless = if not

We don't use will/would after 'unless'. We only use the present simple tense.

1. If we don't leave now, we will miss the train.  
Unless we leave now, we will miss the train.
2. I will give you a present if you get good marks.  
Unless you get good marks, I won't give you a present.
3. Our gardener won't cut the grass if it rains tomorrow.  
Unless it rains, our gardener will cut the grass.
4. If we do the homework, our teacher will be pleased.  
Unless we do the homework, our teacher will not be pleased.
5. Unless you hurry, you won't arrive on time.  
If you don't hurry, you won't arrive on time.
6. Unless it rains, we will go camping.  
If it does not rain, we will go camping.
7. I will forget to post the letter if you don't remind me.  
Unless you remind me, I will forget to post the letter.
8. If you don't exercise, you will get fat.  
Unless you exercise, you will get fat.
9. Unless she books the tickets, she won't go to the concert.  
If she doesn't book the tickets, she won't go to the concert.
10. I will call the police if they don't stop fighting.  
Unless they stop fighting, I will call the police.
